Chris Thomas, EAPC, is working with the bidders on items and Kara Brinster, Foster County State's Attorney has provided guidance on the process. Nothing to report on the ambulance building. Commissioner Hagel stated there has been some change in human service staff. She is still looking for someone to replace the vacancy on the zone board. Commissioner Hagel also attended a CCEDC meeting where discussion was had on grant opportunities through the USDA. There continues to be a housing problem in the community so there is a potential to have a housing study done. Commissioner Utke has the recording of the last SIRN meeting and has been communicating with Jason Wolsky on scheduling an LEPC meeting to get individuals from the state in attendance for an update on the siren program. Discussion was had on charging a fee for gravel hauled out of the gravel pit. Commissioner Scanson also provided an update from Garrison on the pipeline project.

SPECIAL MEETING DECEMBER 11, 2023

At 3:37 pm, Chairman Scanson called the Foster County Commission Special Meeting to order. Roll call included Commissioner Scott Beumer, Commissioner Becky Hagel, Commissioner Alan Scanson, Commissioner David Utke, and Commissioner Pat Copenhaver. Also present was Auditor/Treasurer Ellen Roundy and Chris Thomas with EAPC via Teams.

Commissioner Utke provided a synopsis of the bid received for the Courthouse basement remodel and communication that has occurred with Chris Thomas, EAPC. The building committee had met prior to the special meeting to review the information. There have been no changes to the plans and is based upon safety, air quality and ADA compliance. The BOCC will need to decide on whether to accept the bid or to look at alternative options. These plans were proposed based on the extensive building assessment provided by EAPC.

Ellen Roundy, Auditor/Treasurer provided the BOCC with financials set aside for the project. ARPA funds available: \$603,951.44, Courthouse Repair funds: \$242,230.16, LATCF grant: \$100,000, and levy expected for Courthouse repair in 2024: \$190,900.63 bringing the total set aside to: \$1,137,082.23. The general fund will cover the remainder of the project.

Discussion was had on how to move forward. ARPA funds need to be allocated by the end of 2024 and expensed by 2025. A new building of similar square footage is estimated to be around \$9,000,000.00. Commissioner Copenhaver asked if the entire project needs to be completed at one time. Commissioner Utke stated that if you plan to do the floor, there are some walls that need to be moved, furnace location also needs to be taken into consideration and the bid can be done in phases, but the phases will not take long. Chris Thomas stated that there is currently very little ventilation in the building. The heating units are outdated and no longer covered by warranty, if one were to stop working, the county would have to replace each unit throughout the courthouse. Commissioner Copenhaver also asked about new windows and concerns with the historical building. Thomas stated that windows would help with efficiency, however, it would not align with the intent of the ARPA funds. Commissioner

Utke reiterated there are risks in both accepting and rejecting the bid. The costs are much higher than anticipated, if they wait, they get another bid, the funds are available, and they wouldn't have to take a bond or loan with the interest rates where they are currently at. This project would correct all items that EAPC had previously provided as major concerns on the building. Commissioner Beumer stated if repairing the old is above fifty percent of the cost to build new, you should look more seriously at building versus repairing, however, we are much below that.

Commissioner Beumer motioned to accept the bid, seconded by Commissioner Utke. Discussion on the motion was clarification that the bid would include the alternate G2, and not include alternate G1. Commissioner Hagel stated that per legal council with having Hagel Construction included in the bid as a subcontractor, she can participate in discussion, but will remove herself from the vote. Roll call vote included:

Motion passed.
With no further business, Chairman Scanson adjourned the meeting at 4:52 pm.

DECEMBER 19, 2023

At 3:30pm, Chairman Scanson called the Foster County Commission meeting to order. Roll call included Commissioner Scott Beumer, Commissioner Becky Hagel, Commissioner Alan Scanson, Commissioner Pat Copenhaver, and Commissioner David Utke. Also present was Auditor/Treasurer Ellen Roundy, Road Superintendent Nate Monson, Central Prairie Zone Director Julie St. Germaine and Foster County Independent reporter Leasa Lura.

The meeting began with approval of the minutes for the December 5th, 2023, regular meeting and December 11th, 2023, special meeting. Commissioner Hagel noted two corrections. Commissioner Beumer motioned to approve the minutes with the corrections, seconded by Commissioner Hagel. All voted aye and the motion passed.

Commissioner Copenhaver motioned to approve the bills seconded by Commissioner Utke. All voted aye and the motion passed.

Nate Monson, Road Superintendent, provided the BOCC with an update from the Road Department. The county received around six inches of snow in December with the wind contributing to the clean up process. Monson provided the BOCC with two grant applications for the flex funding program. Commissioner Copenhaver motioned to approve both applications, seconded by Commissioner Beumer. Discussion was had on the funding process; however, the county would still have to accept a grant before committing to the work. All voted aye and the motion passed. Monson provided the BOCC with an updated bid for the motor grader. Commissioner Copenhaver motioned to approve advertising for the motor grader, seconded by Commissioner Utke. All voted aye and the motion passed.

Ellen Roundy, Auditor/Treasurer, presented two resolutions. One for the establishment of precincts and polling locations and one for the selection of election inspector. Roundy had spoken with Michele Seil at the Library and approved both the 2024 Primary and General Election location to be held at the Carrington Library. She also spoke with Marlene Boyer who has served as Foster County Election Inspector for many years and Boyer stated she would serve the role in 2024 as well.

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners of Foster County approve the establishment of precincts and polling locations for the 2024 election cycle per NDCC 16.1-04, 16.1-07, and 16.1-11.1.

WHEREAS, currently, under state law, the Board of County Commissioners, in cooperation with the county auditor, shall set precinct boundaries by December 31st of the year preceding an election. Polling locations must be established by the 64th day before the election though traditionally, Foster County has set polling

locations at the same time as precinct boundaries.

WHEREAS, the Foster County Auditor/Treasurer is committed to providing a positive voting experience to all voters within Foster County while simultaneously upholding the security and integrity of elections. Precinct boundaries were determined using logical boundaries within the county. Proximity, accessibility, and availability of locations were considered when selecting polling locations. The recommendation includes establishing one precinct and one polling location in Foster County.

WHEREAS, it is recommended that the Foster County Board of Commissioners adopt the proposed resolution.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved that the Foster County Commission approves the establishment of precincts and polling locations for the 2024 election cycle as presented; and authorizes the Foster County Auditor/Treasurer to establish early vote as presented and absentee ballot precinct, as necessary.

WHEREAS, The Board of County Commissioners of Foster County approve the appointment of election inspector for the 2024 election cycle per NDCC 16.1-05-01.

WHEREAS, Currently, under state law, the Board of County Commissioners, in cooperation with the county auditor, shall appoint the inspector of the election for all polling locations within Foster County by 40 days preceding the election. Each election board must be comprised of at least one election inspector per polling location within the county. The election inspector supervises the conduct of the election and ensures that all election workers are performing their duties. Additionally, the inspector and judges verify the results of the election and return the election results and associated ballots to the county auditor at the close of polls.

WHEREAS, The Foster County Auditor is committed to providing a positive voting experience to all voters within Foster County while simultaneously upholding the security and integrity of elections. The enclosed list of election inspectors ensures Foster County's success for the upcoming elections.

WHEREAS, it is recommended that the Foster County Board of Commissioners adopt the proposed resolution.

THEREFORE, be it resolved, that the Foster County Commission approves the enclosed list of election inspector and approves the county auditor to fill any vacancies that may exist for the 2024 Primary and General Elections

The resolutions were made by Commissioner Beumer and seconded by Commissioner Copenhaver. All voted aye and the motion passed. Roundy had spoken with Sheriff Justin Johnson on advertising in the NDNA for the vacant deputy sheriff position. This twenty-word ad reaches all papers across the state and is \$160.00 per week. Commissioner Beumer motioned to run the ad for four weeks, seconded by Commissioner Copenhaver. Roll call vote included:

motion passed. Roundy presented year end transfers. The transfer from the general fund to the capital improvement fund had been discussed during budget time. Transfers between roads funds would also take place. Commissioner Utke motioned to approve the year end transfers, seconded by Commissioner Copenhaver. All voted aye and the motion passed. Lastly, Roundy received the last two liquor license applications from establishments located in the county. A beer license for Cows & Co. Creamery and a Beer and Liquor License for Cork and Barrel. Commissioner Copenhaver motioned to approve both licenses, seconded by Commissioner Beumer. All voted aye and the motion passed.

Lee Wahlund, Foster County resident, approached the board to provide additional information regarding the closure of the section line. Information included minutes from other counties closing section lines, the extra territorial mile within the city and NDCC requirements. The BOCC thanked him for doing the additional research and stated when Foster County State's Attorney provides an update, they will keep him informed.

Jerome Zink, Foster County resident, approached the BOCC regarding a lot that Foster County owns by Juanita Lake. The legal description is Lot 10, Block 1 North Juanita Lake Park, First Addition (parcel 02115745). Zink was wondering if the county would be interested in selling the west half and maintaining ownership of the east half for the right of way. The BOCC will review the information provided and consult with Foster County State's Attorney, Kara Brinster and make a decision at a later date.

Chris Thomas, EAPC, joined the commissioner meeting via phone. Thomas established the next steps for the basement project renovation would be for the BOCC to approve the notice of award to the bidder. From there he will notify the bidder and send over a contract for the Foster County State's Attorney to review.

Thomas will then reach out to departments that are affected by the remodel and work on vacating the office space and where temporary walls will be placed during the construction period. Thomas stated he is tempering the expectation on the bidders anticipated start date. It is important for all parties to work through the process and have due diligence with planning so not to interrupt the day-to-day operations of those who work in the courthouse. Commissioner Utke motioned to approve the notice of award, seconded by Commissioner Hagel. All voted aye and the motion passed.

Commissioner discussion included the 2024 Commissioner Committee Appointments. Commissioner Hagel motioned to appoint Commissioner Utke as the 2024 Chairman and Commissioner Beumer as the 2024 Vice-Chairman, and to maintain current committee appointments, seconded by Commissioner Beumer. All voted aye and the motion passed. Roundy presented the 2024 Commissioner Meeting schedule, there was one date change noted. Commissioner Beumer motioned to approve the 2024 Commissioner Meeting schedule with the change, seconded by Commissioner Hagel. All voted aye and the motion passed. The year end special meeting is scheduled for Friday, December 29th at 8:30 AM. Commissioner Utke attended the ambulance building meeting. He stated that they need more ambulance drivers. Commissioner Hagel attended an NDACO meeting and noted that the 9-1-1 fees will be taken over by NDACO at the start of 2024. Commissioner Utke and Commissioner Scanson attended the six-county meeting, the consensus is all counties are struggling with the same items such as employment and roads. Commissioner Scanson noted that we could add the meeting with the ND pipeline association as a reminder on the next agenda. The board consensus with the basement project is that information needs to be relayed, Commissioner Utke or Commissioner Scanson can handle relaying the information versus having a special meeting.

With no further business, Chairman Scanson adjourned the meeting at 4:56 pm.

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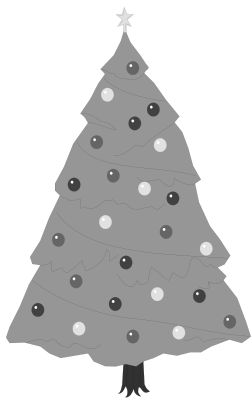
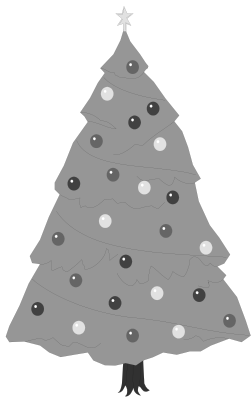
